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

Letter from the Director

Dear All

What an exciting year! This year we completed projects and initiatives relating to our three pillars - academic, service and conference.

The academic pillar primarily consists of <u>Collaborative Online International Learning</u> or (<u>COIL</u>). This is where faculty from Shenandoah work with faculty from another part of the world to create a module in their classes where the domestic and international students work on a joint project. Faculty design the module together and have their students work on their project throughout the semester together, virtually. Both faculty members go through a specifically designed workshop to learn the best practices of COIL virtual exchange and create an abstract of the module. We graduated two more cohorts of COIL faculty impacting hundreds of students worldwide. Our faculty have been profiled in podcasts, webinars, and awarded fellowships and grants for their work and innovative pedagogy.

The service pillar developed a service project between Shenandoah and an international university regarding one of the UN Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs). This last year the Institute coordinated a "Zero Hunger Project" with Yarmouk University in Jordan that aimed to address the issue of food insecurity in their respective communities. The various delegations conducted surveys on how to best serve their local clientele and shared the findings with one another. They further traveled to visit one another and see first hand the impacted populations. Members of the Jordan team were able to publish a paper "Assessing Refugee Preferences for SDG 2 (Zero Hunger) Solutions in Irbid Camp and Sakhra Region: Cultivated Roofs and <u>Refrigerators as Food Banks Interventions</u>² in the internationally recognized journal Sustainability and their results have already influenced Jordanian government policy. Rebecca Gibson from the US team led the creation of a food pantry on Shenandoah's campus through the Center for Civic Engagement and run by the Center's work study students. Rebecca notes that "I am so happy that my experience with the Zero Hunger project has opened the doors to a new opportunity for students to serve their own community."

Last, the highlight of the year was our conference which was a remarkable success with over 300 participants - both in-person and virtual - from various countries attending. The conference highlighted the Institute's various initiatives such as Collaborative Online International Learning (COIL), its Global Zero Hunger Service Project and Pilgrimage Virtual Reality. Partners from around the world – from the United Kingdom to Malaysia – presented on their collaborative projects with Shenandoah faculty, staff and students. Keynote and plenary speakers shared insights and ideas regarding innovation in higher education and the future of global virtual learning. The video recordings of the conference are available on our <u>YouTube channel</u> and conference participants continue to be in touch with one another generating new ideas and projects. Most importantly, the conference witnessed the signing of papers <u>to endow</u> the Barzinji Institute which will give permanence to the Institute's programs and mission.

We look forward to a new phase of the Institute where we will now be endowed and thank our various donors and supporters. We look to further institutionalize COIL and virtual exchange within Shenandoah University and support our alumni network through conferences, webinars and publications. Along the way, we will continue to contribute to the larger COIL, virtual exchange and international partnership community on how we can promote global collaboration and the UN Sustainable Development Goals. COIL Training

Global Virtual Learning araduated two more cohorts on Collaborative Online International Learning (COIL). The training teaches American and international facultu how to create a shared module in their classes based on the UN Sustainable Development Goals and have their students interact with each other and engage in project-based learning. The workshops are organized by Dr. Vicky Spencer with support from Dr. Alanna Tierno. We currently have over 100 trained fellows impacting over 2000 students globally.

Workshops

WiSeMantiq Lecture Series - 2023 CONCEPTS OF ISLAMIC EDUCATION IN BOSNIA AND HERZEGOVINA



The Barzinji Institute facilitated five workshops on Reflective Structured Dialogue (RSD), Town Hall, Pedagogy and the Future of Higher Education. The workshops allow Shenandoah and its partner universities to exchange the newest ideas on higher education and teaching and learning.

The first was on Reflective Structured Dialogue (RSD) at the International Islamic University of Malaysia (IIUM). Shenandoah Universitu faculty members Kevin and Cooper Minister and Bridgewater College faculty members Harriet Hayes and Daniel A. Finseth conducted the workshop which focused on constructive dialogue and how RSD is implemented at Shenandoah and Bridgewater. The Center for Islam in the Contemporary World (CICW) sponsored the workshop.





Associate Provost Amy Sarch and Dean of College of Arts and Sciences Jeff Coker visited the University of Sarajevo where they met with the Faculty of Islamic Studies, visited the University's Women's Center, gave a workshop on Shenandoah University's Town Hall concept and presented on the Future Trends of Higher Education. They then drove to the University of Split and University of Dubrovnik where they met with faculty and international education administrators and discussed COIL virtual exchange partnerships. They finally traveled to the Netherlands where they visited the University of Twente to learn about humanitarian engineering and Amsterdam University of Applied Sciences to learn about European virtual exchange.





COIL Fellows Staci Strobl, Kathleen Eid-Heberle, and Susan Burt presented on COIL faculty training and how it enhanced their pedagogy and teaching. The Fellows also toured the Arab American University of Palestine (AAUP) campus and visited Jerusalem. Shenandoah faculty member Mohammad Obeid led the trip and developed the partnership with AAUP.

Pilgrimage VR





Podcasts

The <u>first is produced by the US-UK Fulbright Commission</u> regarding Staci Strobl and Sammie Buzzard's COIL Virtual Exchange project on climate change. They worked together to have their students create podcasts on <u>Climate Change in Western Australia</u>, <u>Climate Change in the Pacific Islands</u>, and <u>Climate Change in the Canadian Arctic</u>. The <u>second podcast is by the University of Twente's Humanitarian Engineering Program</u> which interviewed Associate Provost Amy Sarch and Dean Jeff Coker. They both speak about the Barzinji Institute, its activities and how it overlaps with concepts regarding humanitarian engineering.
