# Post-Graduate Certificate Nurse-Midwifery



A synchronous online, part-time, one-year certificate program (26 credits)

### PROGRAM DESCRIPTION

The Post-Graduate Certificate (PGC) Nurse-Midwifery (NM) program is designed for RNs who already hold a graduate degree (MS, MSN, DNP, or PhD) in Nursing. The Nurse-Midwifery Certificate program provides the student with the necessary skills and knowledge to assume the role of a Certified Nurse-Midwife in a variety of clinical settings. Didactic and course content focuses on role development and the assessment and management of an individual's health (antepartal, intrapartal, postpartal, and neonatal periods, as well as primary care) throughout the lifespan. Graduates of this certificate program will be eligible to take the national certification examination given by the American Midwifery Certification Board (AMCB). Passing this examination allows the practitioner to use the professional title "Certified Nurse-Midwife."

# PROGRAM PREREQUISITES

- A master's degree in nursing (MSN) from a CCNE, ACEN, or CNEA accredited institution. Recommended 3.0 cumulative GPA
- Active nurse practitioners (NPs): Advanced Health Assessment,
   Advanced Pathophysiology, and Advanced Pharmacology courses.
   Recommended grade of "B" or better.
- For applicants with an MSN in a non-NP area:
  - Undergraduate Chemistry course with grade of "C" or better.
  - Will be required to take Advanced Health Assessment,
     Advanced Pharmacology, Advanced Pathophysiology at
     Shenandoah before progressing to specialty courses.

# **ADMISSIONS REQUIREMENTS**

- Graduate Application with \$30 application fee.
- Unofficial transcripts from all institutions for initial admission
- Unencumbered RN license (multi-state preferred)
- Copy of Advanced Practice Nursing certification as applicable.
   Applicants without national certification will be individually evaluated and must submit evidence of their specialty expertise.
- Current resume/C.V.
- Documentation of one year of direct patient care prior to specialty courses (it is recommended for applicants to have experience in birth settings)
- Essay (250-500 words): Why are you choosing to pursue the Nurse-Midwifery role?
- Two letters of recommendation
  - One from previous faculty (if graduated in the last five years)
  - One professional reference to attest to clinical experience
- Language proficiency must be met. Submission of TOEFL, IELTS, PTE, or Duolingo English Test may be required. See our policy for full details: <a href="https://www.su.edu/admissions/international-students">https://www.su.edu/admissions/international-students</a>
- A recorded video introduction/interview will be required.

If admitted, up-to-date immunization and health records, a criminal background check, a urine drug screen, and CPR from AHA only will be required.

For international students who require a visa, due to limited on-campus hours, F-1 visas are not issued for this program.

Applications are reviewed continuously starting

in January until the cohort is full.

## Format/Location

Synchronous online courses meet one day each week.

Students attend one four-day on-campus immersion in the fall and spring semester.
