Post-Masters Doctor of Nursing Practice



Online, part-time, seven semester doctoral program (33 credits)

PROGRAM DESCRIPTION

The Post-Masters Doctor of Nursing Practice (MSN to DNP) program is designed to prepare clinical nurses with the advanced knowledge and experiences necessary to manage health care in a safe, effective, and efficient manner in a variety of settings. The Post Masters DNP program is open to all post-MSN applicants, including, but not limited to Advanced Practice Registered Nurses (Nurse Practitioners, Certified Nurse Midwives, Clinical Nurse Specialists, and Certified Registered Nurse Anesthesia). Applicants build upon their current specialty.

PROGRAM PREREQUISITES

- A master's degree in nursing (MSN) from a CCNE or an ACEN accredited institution. Recommended 3.0 cumulative GPA.
- Applicants must have completed or will complete the following prerequisite course requirements prior to enrolling at Shenandoah:
 - Graduate Statistics course with a grade of "C" or better within the last three years.

ADMISSIONS REQUIREMENTS

- Graduate Application with \$30 application fee.
- Unofficial transcripts from all institutions for initial admission
- Unencumbered RN license (multi-state preferred)
- Copy of Advanced Practice Nursing certification as applicable.
 Applicants without national certification will be individually evaluated and must submit evidence of their specialty expertise.
- Current resume/C.V.
- Documentation of 2,080 RN or APRN hours (direct patient care required). NP applicants must also be able to verify any previous master's degree precepted clinical hours.
- Essay (750 words): Why are you choosing to pursue the DNP?
 Provide a brief description of an idea for your DNP project.
- Three letters of recommendation
 - One from previous faculty (if graduated in the last five years)
 - Two professional references to attest to clinical experience
- Language proficiency must be met. Submission of TOEFL, IELTS, PTE, or Duolingo English Test may be required. See our policy for full details: https://www.su.edu/admissions/international-students
- A recorded video introduction/interview will be required.

If admitted, the admission will be provisional until the completion of all required health records, documentation of up-to-date required immunizations, completion and acceptable Criminal Background Check and a negative urine drug screen, Proof of valid CPR certification from AHA is also a requirement for admission

For international students who require a visa, due to limited on-campus hours, F-1 visas are not issued for this program.

 Clinical placement is a collaborative process between the student and the faculty. We try to customize the clinical experience to your needs and wants as much as possible. We have current articulation agreements with several sites but will also look at starting up new contracts with sites if you have a relationship with them already.
- Can applicants pursue a new area of specialty in the DNP?
 Applicants build upon their current specialty. If you wish to change specializations, you would first apply to complete a post-graduate certificate in the area of interest (FNP, PMHNP, or Nurse-Midwife) and then apply for the DNP after completion of that certificate.
