An online, part-time, 16-month graduate degree (33 credit hours)

PROGRAM DESCRIPTION

A master's degree in applied behavior analysis (ABA) provides students with a broad set of skills that can be applied in a variety of industries and settings. ABA emphasizes the analysis and design of the environment to improve the performance of individuals as varied as children or adults with autism, parents of behaviorally challenging children, and the corporate executive attempting to maximize the productivity of their employees. Behavior analysts work in an array of settings such as classrooms, homes, clinics and schools, human resource departments, or nonprofit sector work. The curriculum focuses on the use of behavioral assessment methodologies, empirically driven measurement and analysis, and the selection and implementation of function-based treatment strategies that address socially significant behaviors.

PROGRAM PREREQUISITES

- A bachelor's degree from a regionally accredited institution
 - Undergraduate major in psychology, special education, speech pathology, or social work may be helpful, but is not required
 - Minimum recommended cumulative GPA 3.0

ADMISSIONS REQUIREMENTS

- Graduate application with \$30 application fee
- Unofficial transcripts for initial admission from all institutions of higher education previously attended.
- Essay addressing the applicant's reason for applying to the ABA program, including what factors influenced the decision and how this program will help the individual reach professional goals
- Three letters of recommendation (professors, supervisors, or other persons engaged in the practice of ABA or other human services professions)
- Language proficiency requirement must be met. Submission of TOEFL, IELTS, PTE, or Duolingo English Test may be required. See our policy for full details: https://www.su.edu/admissions/international-students

MS APPLIED BEHAVIOR ANALYSIS CURRICULUM

Shenandoah University's online Master of Science in ABA program consists of 33 credit hours, including 21 credit hours of ABA content along with six (6) credit hours of electives and six (6) credit hours for a capstone project. Students arrange their own supervision with recommendations from SU faculty. During the program, faculty intermittently meet with students to review their supervision progress.

This program meets the behavior-analytic coursework requirements for Board Certified Behavior Analyst (BCBA) and Board Certified Assistant Behavior Analyst (BCaBA) certification through the <u>Behavior Analyst Certification Board (BACB) Pathway 2 eligibility route</u>. Applicants will need to meet additional supervision requirements before they are eligible to take the exam.

Shenandoah's Applied Behavior Analysis (ABA) program is certified by the <u>International Behavior Analyst Organization</u>. Through our IBAO certification, international students can still earn their ABA degree at Shenandoah and sit for the IBAO exam.
