



M.S. in Speech-Language Pathology

Division of Communication Sciences & Disorders

A full-time, two-year professional degree program (60 credit hours)

PROGRAM DESCRIPTION

The five-semester, blended Master of Science in Speech-Language Pathology program assists persons in acquiring the skills and knowledge needed for the Certificate of Clinical Competence in Speech-Language Pathology (CCC) by the American Speech-Language-Hearing Association (ASHA). Speech-Language Pathologists (SLPs) are responsible for the diagnosis and treatment of persons with speech, language, cognitive, voice, feeding and swallowing disorders.

PROGRAM PREREQUISITES

- A bachelor's degree from a regionally-accredited institution in speech and language pathology or a related area with a minimum GPA of 3.0.
- Completion of undergraduate courses in Biological Science, Physical Science, Social/Behavioral Science, and Statistics with grade of "B" or better.
- 7 required speech and language pathology prerequisite courses with a grade of "B" or better.

If an applicant completed a bachelor's degree in a related area and has not completed the required prerequisite courses, they must first enroll in those courses before applying to the MS degree in CSDCAS. Shenandoah offers these prerequisite undergraduate courses for [visiting students](#) and is developing an undergraduate certificate to assist in the completion of the required courses.

ADMISSIONS REQUIREMENTS

- Completed CSDCAS application
- Transcripts from all institutions attended
- Minimum of 25 hours of guided clinical observation under a certified and licensed speech-language pathologist
- Three letters of recommendation that indicate applicant's ability to participate in the rigors of graduate school as well as the traits applicants possess to be a future allied health practitioner. This includes persons such as: former or current professors, research supervisors, clinical supervisors or ASHA-certified speech pathologists.
- Personal Statement
- Selected applications will participate in a virtual interview with current faculty members and/or community partners. This interview is designed to allow the applicant the opportunity to explain why they think they would be a great addition to the MS-SLP program.

Students are required to complete 55 course semester hours and 5 elective semester hours.

Some elective options include: SLP 531 Cleft Palate-Craniofacial Disorders, SLP 532 Pediatric Feeding and Swallowing Disorders, and SLP 534 Medical Speech Pathology. Students can also take GEL (HP550) a department sponsored only course.
